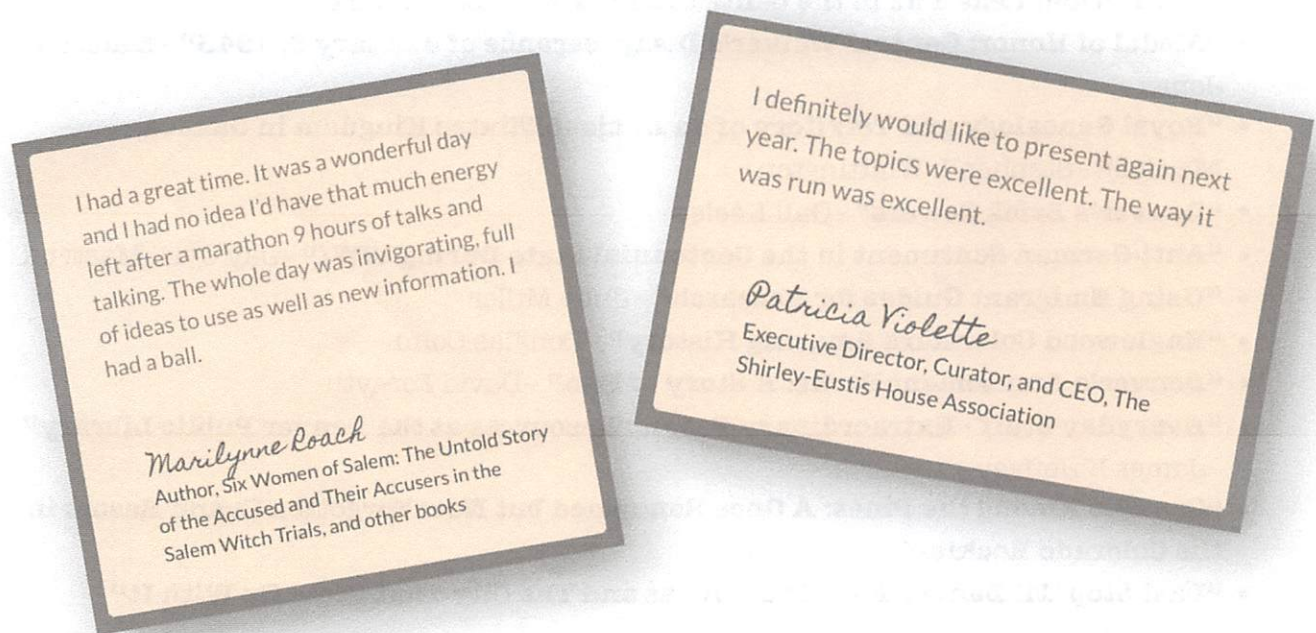
3-4 sessions will run concurrently and attendees will move around to different rooms throughout the day according to which sessions they want to attend.
